

Jupiter Challenge

Planet Jupiter comes to opposition (when the Sun, Earth and Jupiter are all in a line) on the 7th of December, so it is a brilliant object all night in the southern sky all this month. It's above Orion just now and going to be moving towards Taurus in the coming days. The next time Jupiter is in opposition to Earth will be early in January 2026.

The challenge is (we hope) a simple one - take a picture or pictires of Jupiter and the four Gallilean moons, Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto, something like this one from Stellarium but better. You might need two pictures, one showing Jupiter and another showing all four moons, because Callisto is a long way out from Jupiter right now.

Email us a copy or copies with some details of how and when you took the pictures, and we'll put it into the next newsletter! May the clouds stay away from your lenses ...

Scottish Dark Sky Observatory

This week we got the great news that the SDSO Trust has at last managed to acquire a site to rebuild their observatory, at the former Clatteringshaws Visitor Centre on the A712 beside Clatteringshaws Loch, about half-way between Newton Stewart and New Galloway.

The old SDSO observatory, located near the west side of Loch Doon, was destroyed completely by fire some years ago and they have been looking for a new site ever since. The rebuild might take another two years.



The new site is arguably much better than the former one on the Craigengillan Estate, not least because it is much more accessible, being just off the A712, the famous Queen's Way between Edinburgh and Whithorn and reasonably well serviced with adequate parking space. The SDSO now has to get planning consent and funding before building can start.
